It examines the social, economic, political, environmental, and cultural factors that affect the health of a population – the social determinants of health – and analyzes the effectiveness of social and community interventions, health policy, and evidence-based health care delivery models.

Our nation needs new approaches to improve the health of our communities. Population health strategies foster collaboration with diverse sectors, including education, social welfare, housing, transportation, environmental protection, and economic development.

PhD in Health Equity Sciences

The COPH doctorate program integrates the rich history of public health with the more contemporary discipline of population health to provide graduates with a rigorous competency-based degree. The advanced comprehensive training will prepare graduates for positions in settings such as:

- local, state, federal, and global governmental institutions
- non-governmental agencies
- public health
- social justice organizations
- health care provider organizations
- higher learning institutions

The PhD in Health Equity Sciences consists of 66 credit hours total:

- 23 credit hours of core coursework
- 13 credit hours of PH credits
- 12 credit hours of concentration specific coursework
- 18 credit hours of dissertation coursework

The COPH will offer the following concentrations:

- Epidemiology
- Global Health Equity and Policy
- Community Based Participatory Research
- Community Health Education
- Biostatistics

Students interested in the PhD program at UNM College of Population Health need to:

- 1. You are encouraged to meet with an advisor (cophadvising@unm.edu) prior to submitting your application to ensure it is complete.
- 2. Apply through SOPHAS (sophas.org)

Admissions Criteria

- Applicants must hold a graduate master's degree.
 Preference is given to applicants holding a Master
 in Public Health (MPH) degree from a CEPH
 accredited program or another health- or medical related degree. In some instances, students with
 a bachelor's level degree will be considered for
 admittance.
- Documented experience in the form of research, job experience, completion of a master's thesis, or other similar experience, including work in non-governmental agencies (NGOs).GPA of 3.0 or higher.
- One graduate-level coursework in statistics or biostatistics.
- Two-page statement of interest describing professional experience, research interests, career aspirations, and experiences that have prepared the applicant for doctoral work.
- 5. Three letters of recommendation:
 - one from a faculty member who has worked with the applicant in a research capacity,
 - one from a faculty member who taught a class attended by the applicant,
 - and one from an individual of the applicant's choosing.
- Preference will be given to applicants who have submitted a thesis during their master's coursework or have completed a comparable extended project or publication.
